Patent Searches

While patent searches can be very beneficial, actually using patent search results is very difficult. One must understand the content of each prior art patent/reference, both individually and collectively. Study the drawings carefully, use the specification to understand the drawings, and carefully note the claims.

Then, and only then, compare what is in the prior art with what you believe your "invention" is. I use quotes, because in the Patent system an invention is defined by claims, and you are unlikely to have claims if you're having a prior art search done.

Now, a major benefit of a prior art search is in preparing good claims. Two issues:

- First, can you draft a claim that covers what you believe your invention to be (remember, the PTO has not spoken yet) without covering (reading on) the prior art?
- Second, if you can, do you believe that what you might get is worth the effort (think money vs. benefit)? Understand that the PTO will:
 1. Perform its own search (which will likely be done by an Examiner who knows his art like you know your way to work),
 2. Combine references, and
 3. Reject your invention (as being obvious under 35 USC 103 or as being anticipated under 35 USC 102).

Do not despair; almost all patent applications are rejected at least once (in my experience most are rejected at least twice). Do not think that once you file that you're done. Prepare for an Amendment, a second Amendment, an Amendment After Final, a Request for Reconsideration, a Continuation/Divisional, and, if need be, an Appeal.

Also, a suggestion: If you have a prior art search done, and if you file a patent application, file an information disclosure statement (IDS). Get the forms from the PTO web site. One of the easiest and surest ways of invalidating a patent is to show fraud on the patent office, which is usually done by showing that legally required information, was not provided to the PTO. Do not be clever. If your patent ends up having significant value, some high paid patent attorney will be looking into the matter very carefully. He will not be on your side, and he will not be merciful.

- 4) File a complaint with the state Attorney General of your state and also in the state where the invention promoter does business. See: [UIAUSA Attorney Generals Listing](#).

Please visit <http://www.inventored.org/caution/list/> to do your homework on companies and people who scam inventors:

- 1) The initial list was generated by searching the FTC web site for companies or people associated with those companies whom the FTC had brought action against for their invention promotion activity.
- 2) Then other court records were searched and that information added to the list.
- 3) Additional names of people from individual complaints sent to InventorEd or forwarded to InventorEd from other organizations were added only where a company was already identified by FTC or court documents.
- 4) All the above information was sorted and associated groups were color coded to allow easy visual identification of companies who are known to work together or where common ownership is clear. Associations where someone got their start in the business by working for another invention promotion firm but then went on to start their own company are not shown in the caution list. We are happy to supply such information to law enforcement or journalists.
- 5) Last, complaints received about companies who fit the Red Flags profile (<http://www.uiausa.com/subredflag.htm>) are listed in black. Please note that there are no known legal actions against these companies but that we are requesting that they be investigated.

- The first thing people see is your business card...a logo, what your business is.
- Color makes a statement...elegant, bold (red), earthy (green), true (blue), etc.
- Never call yourself an inventor because it conjures an off-the-wall image.
- Use a bullet-point sheet for a snapshot of your product description.
- Consider the subliminal message created by your marketing tools (biz card, brochure, etc.)
- Use the power of words to sell your product with catchy phrases, rhymes, associations, etc.
- Use representative artwork in your marketing tools.
- Create an image around your ideas; keep it simple and dynamic.

Fisher, Moon and Water Pump

What do a predator, planet and mechanical device have in common? Nothing. Martin Fisher and Nick Moon are the inventors of the water pump used widely in Kenya. The water pump is 2.5 feet in length, one foot wide and weighs 25 pounds. It can be carried on a bicycle, installed by the user, repaired without tools and is powerful enough to irrigate 1.5 acres per day.

The pump generates a collective total of \$50 million of annual income, which is more than 0.5% of Kenya's GDP, and has created as many as 25,000 jobs.

The lightweight, portable, treadle pump has a pressurizing head, so water can be driven through a sprinkler or up a slope. Also, the pump can be brought indoors at night and protected from thieves. The design includes moderate lift treadles to accommodate the female users, and the culture, which considers hip-swaying a provocative movement.

The design has no nuts, bolts or fasteners. The valves are engineered to last three years. The materials (rolled steel, pipes and chain) are inexpensive and made by local fabricators.

The sales strategy for the pump rested with the product name and those who demonstrated it. The "MoneyMaker" name suggests that the money is coming out of the ground. "The message is as compelling as sex," according to the name's originator, Bob Hyde. He also established a network of salesmen/demonstrators who set up pumps in front of feed stores throughout Kenya. They answer questions while pumping water, and earn a commission on each sale.

Market research showed funders how well the pump met goals stated in its grant proposals. The results showed that they exceeded targets in revenue and income earned by farmers using the tool by 4000%.

Since most of Kenya's underground water lies beyond the limit of the pump, a new design is in process. The specification is six pages and requires a 60-foot depth of operation by a 50-kg person wearing a skirt, fit into a small van filled with passengers, cost no more than \$125 and irrigate one acre per day with 0.42 liter per second flow rate.

Two engineering hurdles must be overcome: designing a manual pump that will raise water from 60 feet underground, and funding. Deep-well research and development depend on donors. Foreign-aid is spurred by famine and flooding, not daily needs. Poverty is not considered a disaster.

Silicon Valley held the answer to the funding and design challenges. Since becoming a US nonprofit company in Palo Alto, foundation money and private donations are readily available. Partnering opportunities arose for design improvements. Three prototypes were evaluated. The pump chosen was ultra-low tech, sturdy and inexpensive, comprised of two PVC pipes: one nested inside the other and topped with a one-way valve. The small diameter pipe formed a six-foot long piston raised by a rope or chain and pulled down by gravity.

ApproTEC has recently founded ApproTEC-USA to raise funds for ApproTEC's work in Africa and to foster collaborations with industry, academics and the development community in the USA. ApproTEC-USA will eventually become the international headquarters of ApproTEC. It is a registered US non-profit (501(c)(3) status) organization with its headquarters in Palo Alto, California. 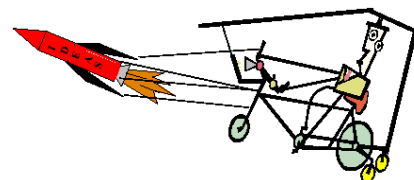
