PLANTING PUBLICITY SEEDS NOW FOR 1ST QUARTER RESULTS:

Some business owners may be of the mindset: "I think we'll wait to launch a publicity campaign until after January 1st." The problem is -- if you wait to launch your publicity campaign until the first of the year hoping for a quick media interest blast in January, you may be in for a quiet month. Keep in mind most media outlets have editorial lead-times of a few weeks to 6 months. Also, what some entrepreneurs don't realize is this. Because of the increasing number of publicity pitches media outlets receive, anything you send out is subjected to what I call the "media digestion period" -- simply put -- that is a period of time (sometimes weeks, sometimes months) that it takes media outlets to:

1. See/understand your release and decide if they are interested;
2. Find space/time in their editorial calendar to place the article/news story/show segment.

The potential placement is also directly dependent upon how quickly and efficiently your publicist or PR agency can help the media secure the placement. Media relations is crucial. Your publicist's job is to make the reporter/editor/producer's job as easy and as effortless as possible - which will lead to quicker and more numerous placements for your business.

When it comes to publicity pitches, the facts are: placement is totally up to the discretion of the particular media outlet; and very few media responses are immediate. I have in fact had media outlets respond even before the media release seemed to settle in the fax machine tray. Conversely, I also had one media outlet that responded 17 months after a pitch. (I had to ask the reporter what the YEAR was on the release!) NO placement is guaranteed, but you can definitely increase the odds. Even if your product/business is a dead-on perfect match for a media outlet's editorial profile, you are not guaranteed placement without some hard work and media relations. That's why timing of your publicity pitch is so critical. Have your publicist get your pitch to the media, allow the editorial staff to digest it a bit, and strategically and professionally "rattle the cage" over the next several weeks to generate as many placements as possible.

What we are trying to do is plant seeds in media outlets' editorial garden so they will bear fruit -- in the form of articles/show placements -- continuously over the next several weeks and months. Like the plant that comes from a seed, publicity placements can also grow roots and lead to other arterial media placements in other media outlets. Given the right tending, the publicity seeds you plant over the next few weeks/months will indeed germinate and you'll reap a wonderful harvest for your business well past the first quarter of next year.

Patent Strategies in Light of the New Rules

The latest rules from the US Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) are quite sweeping. The new rules have several facets. On one hand, the USPTO is limiting the number of continuation and continuation in part applications, as well as requests for continued examination (RCE). On the other hand, the USPTO is limiting the number of claims you can have by forcing the applicant to file an Examination Support Document if you exceed the claims.

Another twist is that the Examination Support Document may be forced where two applications are filed nearly simultaneously. The USPTO may assume that they cover the same patentable material and force an Examination Support Document unless you can prove that the applications do not cover the same material.

Russ Krajec, a registered patent attorney, engineer and inventor with over 20 United States patents, explains his approach to these situations in his article, *Patent Strategies in Light of the New Rules*. The U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE's) Inventions and Innovation (I&I) offers financial and technical support to inventors and businesses for promising energy-saving concepts and technologies. I&I selects technologies to receive grants through a competitive process.

At present, I&I has no funding for its activities in fiscal year 2007, so it has announced no upcoming funding opportunity solicitations. I&I accepts proposals only during open solicitations. Please continue to visit the I&I website (www1.eere.energy.gov/inventions) and click the Financial Opportunities tab for information about any upcoming solicitations. ❖

JPL Annual Invention Challenge

The JPL Annual Invention Challenge is ready for its tenth year. The title for this year's contest is the *Play a Song* contest. The objective is to create a device that is capable of performing two tasks. The first task is to replicate a C Major scale. The second task is to play at least the first ten notes of a recognizable song of your choice in proper pitch, tempo, and meter.

The annual event is a friendly, yet challenging competition open to JPL employees and contractors, their family members, and students from local middle and high schools. Each year, a different engineering challenge is selected. The goal of the Invention Challenge is to show students that math, science and engineering can be fun. I received an email from an attendee of the last meeting who requested that inventors be informed of the benefits and issues with a Provisional Patent Application (PPA). You can, by filing a provisional application, establish an early effective filing date for a patent claim and avoid an impending statutory bar to patentability.

A Provisional Patent Application is useful when there is a real-time crunch. However, there is significant risk that some necessary detail may not be included or described with sufficient clarity. A provisional application can also be used to "timeshift" the term of the patent. 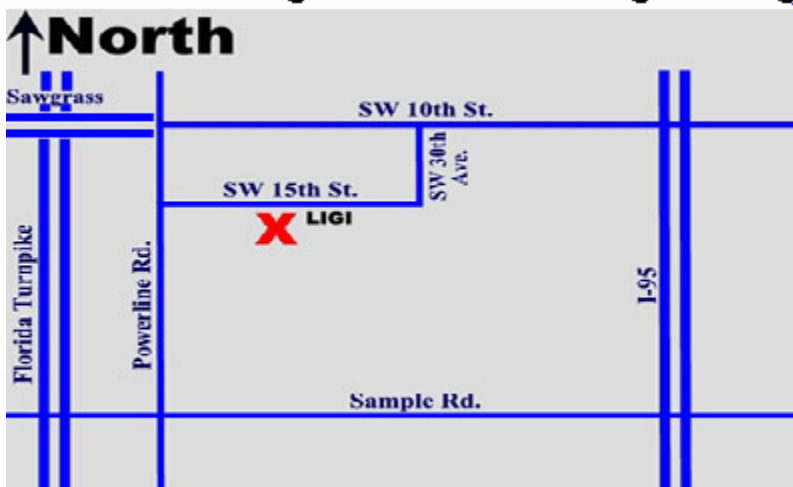

Filing a provisional patent application (PPA) guards against rip-offs while buying time to file a regular patent application. It allows an inventor to claim "patent pending" status for the invention for 12 months, but involves only a small fraction of the work and cost of a regular patent application. Patent Office Rule Changes

The USPTO has placed severe limits on the number of patent claims an application can contain; on the number of "continuations" (i.e., patent applications that draw priority from an earlier application) that can be filed; and on the amount of permissible negotiation with a patent examiner before an appeal must be filed or an application abandoned. The hallmark flexibility of the U.S. patent system, in other words, has been substantially curtailed.
